Mourners honor Iowan Deutsch for 'ultimate sacrifice' in Iraq

Dubuque, Ia. — More than 100 mourners said goodbye Saturday to Dubuque's first soldier killed in Iraq, Army Pvt. Michael Deutsch.

The 21-year-old died July 31 of injuries from an explosives round when the armored personnel carrier he was riding in was attacked, officials said. He was buried this weekend in his hometown. Family, friends and strangers packed the Regina Caeli Chapel at Mount Calvary Cemetery. Some waited outside, praying to themselves. Others stood at attention to honor a fellow veteran.

Margaret Deutsch Link, Deutsch's 79-year-old great aunt, came to honor a loved one who died too young.

"I admire him," she said. "These young boys do a lot for their country, like Michael did."

Jeff Kemp stood beneath a pine

tree with his three children. The 32-year-old did not know Deutsch, but he wanted his children — ages 10 to 13 — to remember the fellow Dubuque resident who died for his country.

Kemp served in the Army during the conflict in Panama. "I know exactly what the kid was going through. He was able to dig deep through the fear to find the courage to serve his country. I think that's exceptional. I brought my kids to understand what this young man did for all of us," he said.

In the chapel Saturday, Deutsch was remembered as an intelligent, brave, caring young man who felt a call to defend America. His father, Wayne, had said his son enlisted after the Sept. 11, 2001, attacks.

Deutsch was a member of the Army's 1st Armored Division. He graduated from Dubuque Senior High School in 2000 and joined the Army in 2002. He completed basic training at Fort Benning, Ga., near Columbus, and was stationed in Germany before his unit was sent to Iraq.

The young man, mourners said, should be remembered for who he was and what he died to protect.

"I didn't know Private Deutsch, but I know 20,000 like him," said Maj. Gen. Terry Tucker, the commanding general at Fort Knox, Ky. "Private Deutsch was a good soldier. He served his family well, he served his country well. ... He gave the ultimate sacrifice."

At the funeral service, a speaker read from a letter Deutsch had sent his family from Iraq, in which the young man asked them to "accept this change." The line was, friends said, a sign of the sacrifice Deutsch was willing to make for his

country.

Then music played, the chapel doors opened, and U.S. soldiers carried Deutsch's casket, draped in an American flag, from the chapel. Family and friends followed.

"He was just a good kid," said 27-year-old Cory Plants, a friend of the Deutsch family, which includes Wayne, mom Ilene, three siblings and two nieces.

Mourners walked about a half-mile through the cemetery. A procession of cars lined the single lane to the grave site.

"We're here to show respect," said 23-year-old Pvt. Rollo Pickens of Fort Knox. "He was over there fighting for freedom."

Seven U.S. soldiers fired pistols into the air. Family, friends and the

strangers who came to honor Deutsch stood silent.

Finally a trumpet played, the soldiers and veterans saluted, and family and friends cried.

Deutsch's coffin was carried to his grave site. His flag was folded and presented to his parents.

"He's a hero," a 73-year-old woman said, crying. "They're all heroes over there."

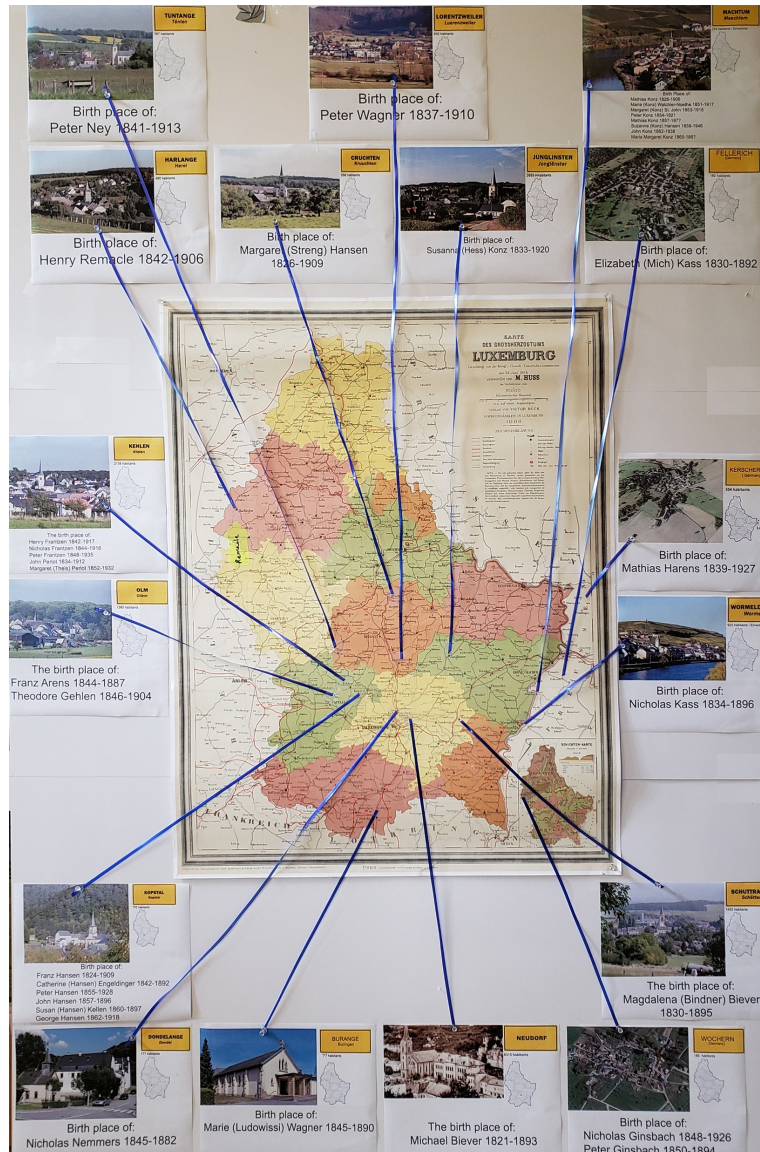

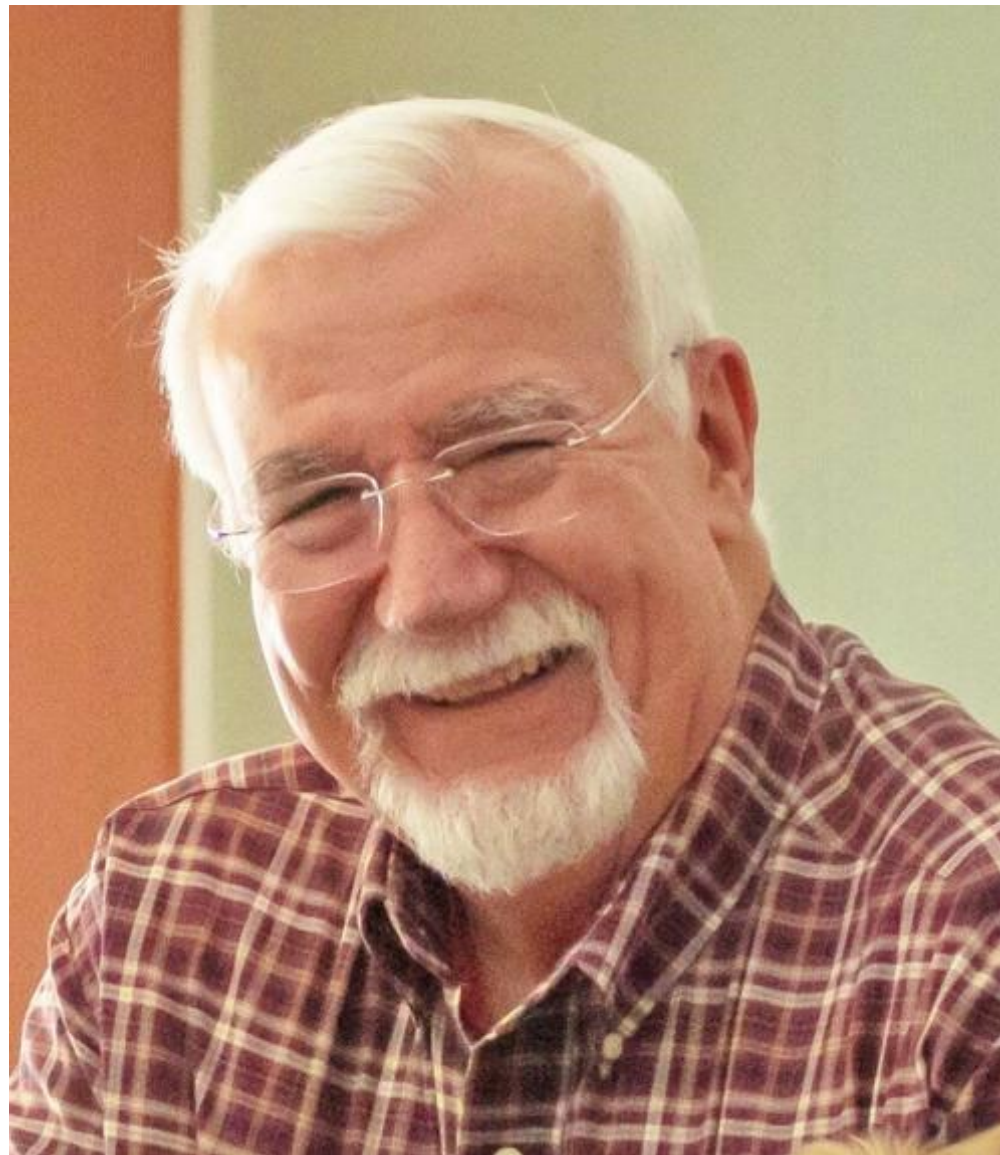

Pringle, April 6—Funeral services for John Albert Kirk, 93, who died Friday in Rapid City, were held here Tuesday. The Rev. A. K. Pritchett officiated.

State Welfare Office At Alamo to Be Moved

WESLACO — The Alamo office of the State Welfare Department, staffed by two workers and a stenographer, may move to Weslaco temporarily, it was learned Tuesday.

The City of Alamo, which has supplied \$72 a month for rent, utilities and yard work for about six years, is cutting off the funds effective Oct. 1.

Mayor John Ginsbach of Alamo said there was "no friction" involved. He said the city was a little short of money and decided to discontinue the expense.

Ginsbach said he had received a "very nice letter" from James A. Covey, state welfare chief for the area, thanking the city for the aid it had given.

Harold J. Plaas, Alamo city secretary, said the city had been paying the \$72 rent and utilities for a building on East Main Street since 1957. He said at the time the welfare department office was established in Alamo, San Juan and Pharr were supposed to share the expense, but never did.

Ginsbach said he was not in office at the time the arrangement was made and was not familiar with the original agreement.

Mayor R. S. Bowe of Pharr said the welfare people had approached him about supplying space. But he said Pharr had no provision in its budget to cover the expense.

Covey was unavailable for comment Tuesday.

It was learned he had asked permission to move the office equipment to Weslaco temporarily until a decision could be made on a new location.

The state welfare office in Weslaco opened several months ago

after County Commissioner Herbert Pike of Weslaco provided office space in a county building and the City of Weslaco agreed to pay utility expense. The Weslaco staff was transferred from Edinburg.

The State Welfare Department had no budgeted funds to pay rent or utilities.

Head-On Collision Of Transport, Car West Of S. F. Takes Life Of War Veteran, Eugene Pirrung, 27

Funeral mass for Eugene Pirrung, 27, Rt. 3, who was killed in a head-on collision between a gasoline transport and a 1937 sedan at 2:15 p. m. Friday a mile west of the Wall lake corner 12 miles west of Sioux Falls, has been tentatively scheduled for Monday morning at St. George's church, Hartford. Interment is to be made in the Hartford Catholic cemetery. Until the time of services, the body is to lie at the Barnett Funeral chapel here.

State's Attorney Jerry Maher said today that no inquest would be held.

Mr. Pirrung was flung from his vehicle and was found lying partially in the field on the south side of the highway.

The driver of the transport, George Clark, 24, Fedora, was bruised severely. The vehicle was owned by Roger Greene, Fedora.

Coupe Stalls

Engine trouble had caused a 1931 coupe driven by Loren Krier, Larchwood, Ia., which was proceeding east, to stall on the highway. Krier ran to the rear of his vehicle and flagged the car which was following him to a halt.

At that instant Mr. Pirrung, also proceeding east, pulled into the wrong lane of traffic and into the path of the transport. Clark told Sheriff H. B. McFarland that he was driving between 40 and 45 miles per hour.

Impact of the crash and the transport's momentum pushed the car nearly 60 feet west where both vehicles came to rest on the south side of the pavement. The rear wheels of the transport were in the ditch, the rest of the vehicle being in the field. The car was on the south of the ditch.

The front of the car was demolished, one wheel being torn nearly off. Condition of the transport cab indicated that it had rolled over. Damage was estimated at nearly \$1,500.

Explosion Averted

When the transport came to rest the motor was blazing and gasoline was pouring from the tank. Prompt work by Clark with a hand extin-

guisher prevented an explosion.

The accident happened 100 feet east of the entrance to the Thomas Rabenberg farm west of the Wall lake corner. Frank Schnecht, Parker, who had been driving behind the transport was the first witness at the scene.

Clarence J. Rufer, police detective, was approaching Sioux Falls from the west at the time of the accident. He drove to the Wall lake corner where he called for a Banton ambulance, then returned to begin an investigation.

With McFarland were State Patrolman William Zeitner and Police Patrolman Russell Rogers.

Served Overseas

Mr. Pirrung was born April 27, 1920, in Sioux Falls and attended school at Hartford. He entered the army June 16, 1944, and, as an air force mechanic, served in England and France. After his discharge November 28, 1945, he worked in this area. He was employed by the Wagner Construction Co., at the time of his death.

Surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Peter Pirrung, with whom he lived, and one brother, Cyril, 1310 West Sixth st.

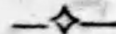

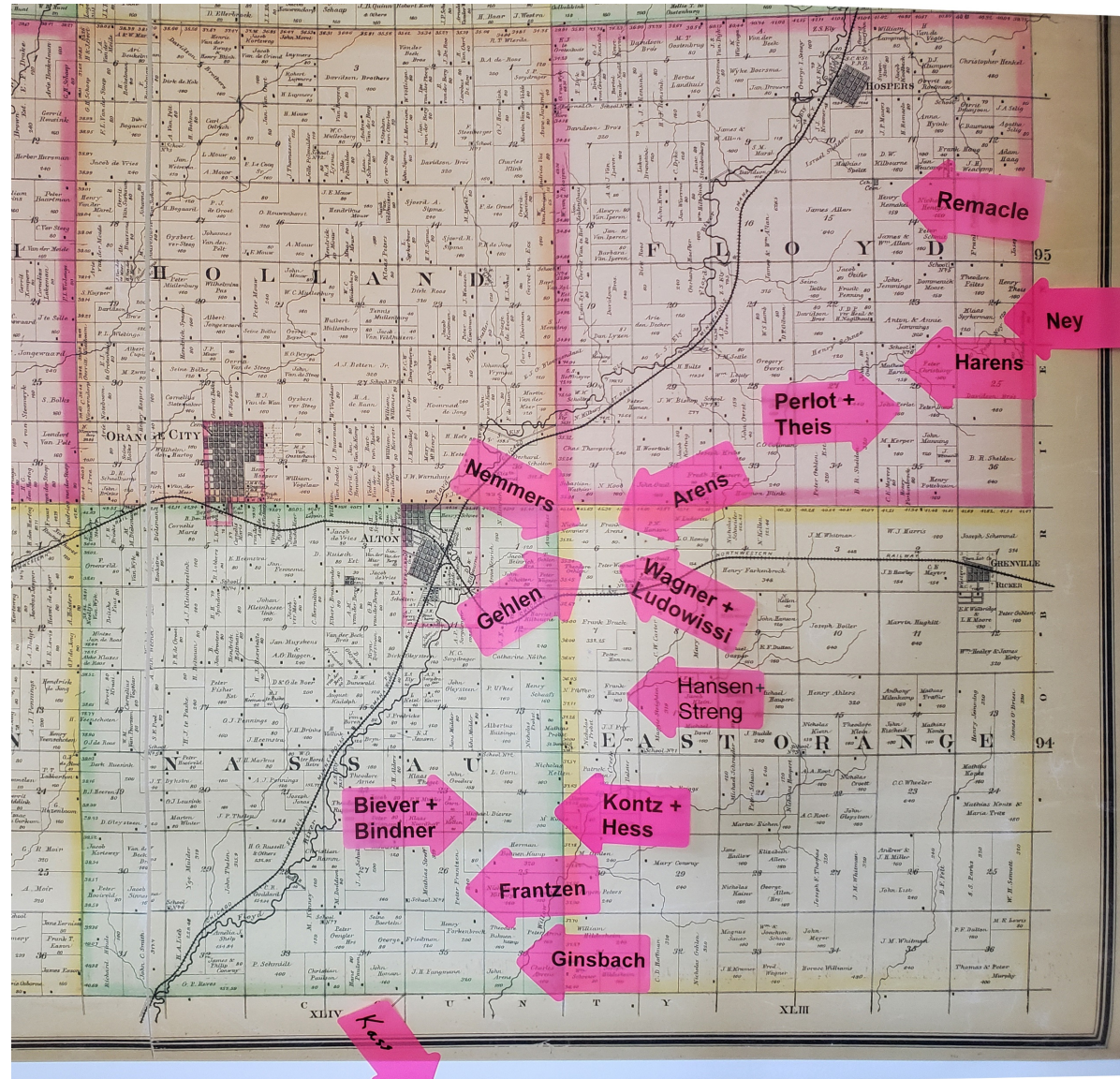
